2016 will bring to closure my Stoneleigh Foundation Senior Fellowship Project (The Integration of Responsible Fatherhood within Foster Care Service Delivery and Other Children and Youth Servicing Systems); while at the same time propel forward The Strong Families Commission Incorporated ("The Commission"), as the sustaining entity for championing the conversation and building the awareness of the value of Responsible Fatherhood in the lives of children.

Commission Update: 2016 Strategic Plan

The Commission's 9 point strategic plan includes the following:

- 1. Expand the Commission;
- 2. Establish a working relationship with members of City Council, Office of the Mayor, and Leadership within the Court System;
- Partner with the City's new Mayor to document current policies and procedures that strengthen child and families, inclusive of men within those families;
- 4. Launch a quiet campaign to educate the media, as well as the philanthropic, public, private and corporate community about the value of fathers in the well-being of children;
- 5. Continue to build collaborative relationships with children, youth, and family-focused agencies that are inclusive of fathers within the Greater Philadelphia Metropolitan area;
- 6. Aggressively pursue the Commission's public education and advocacy strategy;
- 7. Develop and execute a sustaining fundraising strategy;
- 8. Host a state-wide Conference addressing the challenges that children face without the benefit of both of their parents; and
- 9. Execute the Commission's new initiatives;
 - a. Systems' Impediment Review (SIR): Documenting the Challenges of Serving Children and Families
 - b. Legal Call to Action: A Public Appeal for Change of Policy
 - c. Engaging Families and Systems of Care: Schuylkill West Mobilization Demonstration Project.

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News from the Nation's Capital

The Commission Supports Proposed Changes in the Federal Child Support Program

The Strong Families Commission joined 40 plus other fatherhood, family and child well-being, labor, and criminal justice organizations by "signing on" to a letter to the White House in which the Administration was encouraged to finalize the proposed rule changes to the federal Child Support Program.

The big ticket items that would improve the situation of non-residential fathers are three-fold: 1) prohibit the accumulation of child support debt while a parent is incarcerated; 2) allow child support agencies to provide

employment services to non-residential parents; and 3) base child support payments on actual earnings. All of these changes would positively impact the lives of fathers and their children and, we believe, put an end to the unintended consequences of accumulating child support arears while parents are incarcerated.

In summary, the proposed rules are aimed at modernizing the federal Child Support Program, and to break the link between unaffordable child support orders/arrears and mass incarceration. Furthermore, the proposed rule is critical in reducing the barriers to reentry for formerly incarcerated individuals who are noncustodial parents. For those individuals – overwhelmingly men of color – the stakes for themselves and their families are incredibly high. Another other important feature of the proposed rule is the requirement that states consider noncustodial parents' ability to pay when setting child support orders. The letter to the Administration argues that evidence shows that "realistic, income-based orders result in more regular child support payments over time."

Good News! Continued Funding for Federal Teen Pregnancy Prevention Programs (TPPP)

On December 18, 2015, Congress passed, and the President signed into law, the omnibus appropriations bill (H.R. 2029), which funds the government through the remainder of Fiscal Year (FY) 2016. The bill received bipartisan support, passing the House 316-113 and the Senate 65-33.

The bill maintains funding for programs critical to reducing teen and unplanned pregnancy, including \$101 million for TPPP and \$286.5 million for Title X. Research Findings of Interest

The Link between Family Structure and Financial Circumstances by Pew Research Center

The dramatic changes that have taken place in family living arrangements have no doubt contributed to the growing share of children living at the economic margins. In 2014, 62% of children younger than 18 lived in a household with two married parents – a historic low, according to a new Pew Research Center analysis of data from the U.S. Census Bureau. The share of U.S. kids living with only one parent stood at 26% in 2014. And the share in households with two parents who are living together but not married (7%) has risen steadily in recent years (1) Note.

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These patterns differ sharply across racial and ethnic groups. Large majorities of white (72%) and Asian-American (82%) children are living with two married parents, as are 55% of Hispanic children. By contrast only 31% of African American children are living with two married parents, while more than half (54%) are living in a single-parent household.

The economic outcomes for these different types of families vary dramatically. In 2014, 31% of children living in single-parent households were living below the poverty line, as were 21% of children living with two cohabiting parents (2) Source. By contrast, only one-in-ten children living with two married parents were in this circumstance. In fact, more than half (57%) of those living with married parents were in households with incomes at least 200% above the poverty line, compared with just 21% of those living in single-parent households.





Note: Based on children under 18. Data regarding cohabitation are not available prior to 1990; in earlier years, cohabiting parents are included in "one parent." Poverty is measured using the Supplemental Poverty Measure (SPM) and not the Official Poverty Measure.
